
## STAMP COLLECTING

What does this have to do with motorcycling? Well your past President and current Newsletter Editor has been a stamp collector since he was a kid. (Go ahead and get it off your chest, you didn't know they made postage stamps that long ago). Stamp collecting has declined over the past many years for a lot of reasons. A form of stamp collecting is called "Topical Collecting". Pick a topic, do a tremendous amount of research and collect stamp only of your chosen topic. I have been collecting "motorcycles on stamps" for about fifteen years. My research has detected approximately 700 stamps world wide have been created and printed for postage. Some of these stamps are pure artwork. Beautiful images of motorcycles with scenery, people, accessory, safety, or political statements. The stamps from the Isle of Man are probably the most detailed in the world. Japan manufacturing is the country that really started the motorcycle craze in the United States with the Honda 750. From that point on motorcycling has blossomed over the years. I have stamps from Italy, Belize, the Congo, and some of the most remote places on Earth, but Japan has never issued a postage stamp with a motorcycle on it. I mention all this because commensurate with the Sturgis rally this year, the United States will issues a set of stamps commemorating the role of motorcycles in American's culture. They will be released at the annual motorcycle rally in Sturgis, S.D. in August. Shortly thereafter, you can purchase these stamps from your local Post Office. If I can get any advanced info and images of these stamps, I will include it in a future issue of our newsletter.
